January 4th is a special day in our house because, almost six years ago now, on the 4th of January, Cassie and I stood before God, our families, and our spiritual community and made a covenant to be husband and wife for as long as we both shall live. Now, after six years, two addresses, and one child, we love each other as much as ever and gladly share in both the joys and challenges of life together. Praise be to God, life is good. So why, after church on January 4th, will I be using a few days off to celebrate this anniversary with Cassie? What is so special about January 4th when we are doing the work of marriage the other 364 days as well?

Really, you can think of any special day like this. Why celebrate Independence Day when America exists all year round? Why celebrate Easter if the tomb is still empty? The simple answer is that we are all naturally forgetful. Amidst the demands of ordinary time, we often lose sight of our rights, duties, and privileges as citizens, of the truth and power of the resurrection, and, yes, even of the commitments we made at our wedding and the love which compelled us to make them. It isn't as though they aren't there or aren't deeply important, but perhaps they aren't always as fresh on our minds as we would like.

It just so happens that this year, **Sunday**, **January 4**, we will not only be a special day for our family, but also for our church. As the day when the church around the world remembers Jesus's baptism, we will have the opportunity to welcome new members into our covenant community through baptism, confirmation, and transfer of membership. And whenever we welcome new people into our covenant community, the church is also given an opportunity to renew the vows of baptism and membership that it has taken.

Last year, we began calling this celebration **Covenant Sunday.** On that day we baptized and confirmed one youth, and confirmed two adults, one of whom was a new member as well. We also provided all in attendance with an invitation to recall and celebrate their membership covenant through a faith commitment form (see next page).

This form contains suggestions for how you can renew your own commitment to support this church through your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your service. By taking the time to renew and celebrate your commitment, you will help our community continue to steward our mission well and support you in your own growth in grace. The forms are collected and confidentially reviewed by the Pastor (me), the Lay Leader (Steve Hill), and the Staff-Parish Relations Chair (Darwin Kuhl) so that we can support you in your relationship with God through prayer and encouragement, and so that we can make informed decisions about the ministry opportunities and finances of our church.

As a result of last year's commitments, we were able to staff our summer Vacation Bible School, launch our discipleship team, and create a strategic budget based on a reliable projection of our annual operating income. Furthermore, we committed to pray for 27 unchurched or de-churched households and are already seeing the fruit of those prayers.

Every so often, we need to remember and celebrate the gift of being in a covenant with God. And so, on January 4th, we are asking you to make a commitment to God in Faith as a Member of Bellevue Methodist Church. If you are not yet a member, please join us for the "Methods" Sunday School Class starting at 9:30 AM in the Fellowship Hall on November 30th. And if you are a member, would you ask God to show you how He is inviting you to invest in your relationship with Him as a member of this church? I hope you will say "yes" to this invitation to celebrate what God is doing in our church together, and please feel free to contact me with any questions you might have about this opportunity.


Bellevue Good Samaritan Wish-Upon-A-Star Project

What I am Reading...



Revelation for the Rest of Us, Scot McKnight: I confess I am not actually reading this...yet. It is currently in my online shopping cart based on a recommendation from a close friend and colleague. But, I love Dr. McKnight's other work on New Testament Discipleship and plan to use this book in preparation for both an upcoming sermon series and our Tuesday Bible Study, so pick up a copy if you want a look behind the scenes.



The Intentional Father, Jon Tyson: Jon Tyson is one of the public Christian leaders whose ministry I look to for wisdom and ideas. In this book, he lays out a strategy for moving from being an "involved" parent to intentionally cultivating faith, courage, and character as the father of boys. When I was a kid, my dad picked up a book called *Raising a Modern Day Knight*, by Robert Lewis, that helped set him on a journey of intentionally fathering my

brother and I. Tyson has set out to do the same for a new generation and I can't wait to read more.



The Good, The Bad, & The Ugly, George Cantor: A birthday present from Cassie and Joel for an avid sports fan (yours truly). Cantor covers the highs and lows across the full breadth of Tigers history. This book fills a niche I call "easy reading" and is part of my evening routine to wind down at the end of the day without sitting in front of my phone or the TV.

What I am Listening to...



"The Biggest Story Podcast", Crossway Publishing: It is surprisingly difficult to get much reading done with a one-year-old at home. But a few weeks ago, Joel and I listened to "The Biggest Story", a short family-oriented podcast that re-tells portions of the Bible in language kids can understand. In less than fifteen minutes, I was able to share a hands-free morning quiet time in

the Bible over Cheerios with Joel. Consider sharing with your grandkids next time they come over or putting it on in the car on the way to school.



"What's News", The Wall Street Journal: I always say that our news consumption is like a diet. To maintain a healthy lifestyle, it's essential to have variety. The Wall Street Journal's daily news podcast is just one of the sources that "puts some color on my plate". I usually find it to be objective and astute in its coverage of a variety of topics and across the political


Operation Christmas Child




Discipleship Training—8 November


